Reclaiming Course Expenses

It has been the case for some time, that Clubs can request a refund on any accredited course fees that your personnel may complete, be that for First Aid, Coaching, Game Rules, etc.

We have recently approved a new CRFU rule whereby any course fee, up to and including £30, incurred by a club member may be 100% reclaimed from the CRFU. Above £30, it remains as 50% that may be reclaimed.

CRFU affiliated clubs should forward to the Treasurer (treasurer@crfu.co.uk) a copy of their annual accounts - suitably prepared and/or audited - which conclude during 2023, by the end of this calendar year.

To date, we have received 9 (thank-you for those), knowing also that the majority of clubs have year ends which fall in the period March - June.

This is not only a Rule (18.2) of the CRFU, but also a Regulation of the RFU (5.1.3) that this is completed every year. So could we ask you to forward on your Accounts in line with this request as soon as you can please.

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Women & Girls



As we eagerly await the fixtures for the Cornwall Women's Campaign 2024, there is plenty of rugby to keep us entertained in the county.

Our highest ranked team Penryn in NC 1 South West have had a hard start to the season only winning 1 of their 4 games so far but they are building a strong team and have great ambitions for the future, they are growing the girls set up and creating a great pathway for a sustainable future.

In the League below NC 2 South West (West) we have 3 Cornish teams and sitting top of the league and unbeaten in the Women's Junior Cup are Launceston, this team is gunning for the top spot and have yet to find an opponent to challenge them. 4th in the table is Helston, newly promoted to this league they have had some strong results but have struggled with a few injuries and so have only played 3 games so far this season but are looking like they belong in this group, and we are hopeful that they can go into the New Year strong.

Bude are currently bottom of this league but like Helston have been hit with injuries and have only played 3 games so plenty of time to get themselves back up the table, with their last game beating Devonport Services 12-0 the signs are looking good to stay up.

NC 3 South West (West) we have Truro and Camborne sitting 4^{th} and 6^{th} respectively, plenty to play for in this league Truro have had a slow start to the season but their latest result gives us much to look forward too, drawing with Exeter Saracens was a turning point for them winning their last two games convincingly. Camborne have had a tough start to the season but pulled off an impressive 51-15 win over Teignmouth so there is hope they can move forward with confidence.

As the game grows in Cornwall, we are delighted that Falmouth now has a women's set up and are pushing to join the other Cornish clubs in the main leagues, they have few games now with mixed results but a massive step forward to a up and coming club.

Another up and coming women's team after a successful Inner Warrior Day is St Austell, 'Inner Warrior' days are a great taster for women wanting to get involved in rugby no matter what ability. With over 30 women showing an interest we are hoping that this will be something they can grow to add to our growing community.

As we are still growing the game in the county, we have players playing over the Tamar in Ivybridge, playing in Championship Southwest 2, so accessing a higher level of rugby, we are proud that we have the talent to compete in this league and are hoping this will help inspire the county to more success. Leading our players over the water is our Captain Amy Bunt helping us promote the game and inspiring wherever she can. We also have representatives in Devonport Services and Plymstock Albion Oaks to look out for too.

Camborne put on fantastic hospitality and invited many former players and members from both teams. It was pretty warm inside the marquee on a glorious sunny day but old rivalries were forgotten and memories shared with former team mates and opponents. Camborne came out on top in a thoroughly enjoyable game but no doubt Redruth are eagerly awaiting the chance for revenge when they host their neighbours on 16th December.

Having seen Perranporth play their fixture at home to fellow high flyers Saltash in counties 2 caught my attention. Another glorious day suited the style of both teams and the 1st half was tight before Saltash pulled clear in the second. Both teams produced quality rugby in a great match.

My next match took me further afield to see St Ives take on Penryn. It was another fixture that promised to be close and both sides played attacking rugby from the outset. Penryn would have been disappointed to leave without a bonus point having had the opportunities to get something from the game, if not win it. It was lovely to meet up with my former Bath team mate Ian Sanders and Cornwall team mates from the 1991 final Billy Peters and Tommy Basset. Between Billy, Tommy and me who is the odd one out? Next trip was a short one to Lankelly Fowey to see them take on Wadebridge 2's.

It was great to see some familiar faces from both sides playing, however Wadebridge proved too strong as was expected given their 1st teams form. Lankelly Fowey were better than the scoreline suggests and it was an enjoyable match despite the deteriorating conditions.

The following week I got to see Camels 1st's down at Truro. The players, coaches and supporters observed a minutes applause prior to the game which went ahead despite the tragic events the previous day. I didn't know Chris personally but was told he wouldn't have had it any other way. The game saw Newquay win comfortably but I was delighted to see the quality on show from both sides. Falmouth can take positives from scoring the best try of the match and finishing strongly against a very strong and talented Newquay team.

Whilst mentioning Newquay I would like to mention and congratulate Newquay Tretheras School u15's on making it to the quarter finals of the national u15's Cup. They had notable wins on the way, beating Redruth, Wellington & Blundells before losing at a very strong Millfield School.

Following this game I went on down to Penzance to see how the pros do it.

Unfortunately Pirates came unstuck against a very determined and physical Doncaster Knights team, but showed real spirit to at least clinch a bonus point with 2 late tries as conditions deteriorated. On reflection The Pirates won't have be happy with the errors and penalty count.

One thing from this game I didn't enjoy is players whooping and clapping every mistake made by their opponents. I may be biased but it sounded to me like Doncaster were adept at it in this match!

I know they're not the only side that do it but I do not think it is in the spirit of the game and sets a poor example to our youngsters.
